BEE SQUAD COMPLETED SEASON SATURDAY

The Pierre Bees traveled to Harrold Saturday night, meeting a crushing defeat of 14 points at the hands of their team. This game marked the end of the Bees' season.

The team's hopes were high over the possibility of defeating the powerful Harrold five which they previously overcame on the home floor two weeks ago. No doubt the Harrold squad was out for the B's skins after their narrow defeat. Harrold's small floor was a disadvantage to the Pierre boys. At any rate this game proved a fitting conclusion to the season's schedule.

After a poor start, the Bees lifted their conference standing .166 and two-thirds to .333 in the last month, losing only one conference game to the Bunt Monarchs by a 3 point margin.
