HOMEROOM ELECTION HI-LIGHT

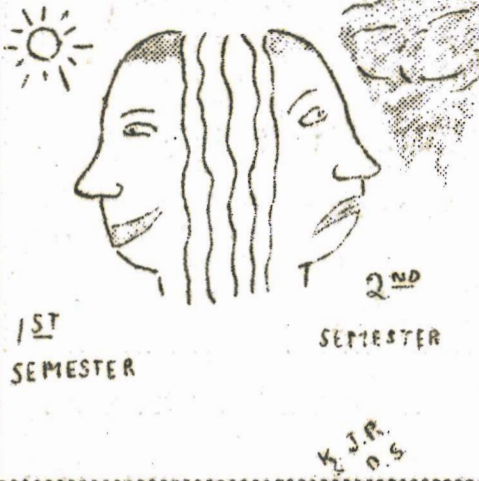

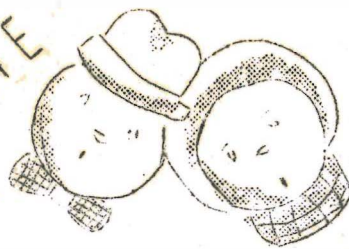
