

PIERRE TRACK TEAM CAPS STATE TITLE

The Pierre Governors, led by the star sprinter, Lindy Feeney, nosed out the Sicux Falls Warriors by one point, 27 to 26, to take the state track and field meet at Huron last S aturday. A farm boy by the name of Harold Lynn cracked the state mile record by 4 tenths of a second, running it in 4. 34.7.

Pierre took firsts in three events: the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash, and the 880 yard relay. The last event of the day, the mile relay, was the deciding factor of the meet, and Pierre was saved by the Platte team which came in first. The prospects for next year's track team will also be good, with many veterans returning.
