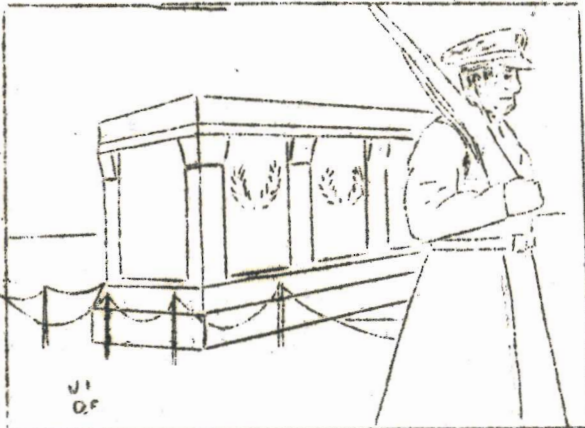
MANAGER OF PIERRE THEATER OFFERS FREE PASSES

PIERRE WINS LAST GAME 27-0

TIGERS CLAW GOVERNORS 32-13

The Huron Tigers routed the Pierre Hi eleven 32-13 in a thrilling night game at Huron's annual Homecoming, Friday evening October 28th. The powerful Tigers got off to a good start making three counters in the first half and two in the last with the Governors held to one in each half.

Huron scored in the quarter and did not make the extra point. Again in the second period they marched across. It was in this quarter that Pierre team showed a little life on a pass from Starkey to Feeney, the speedy Irishman who then went 50 yds. for a tally for Pierre.

The score stood 12-6 on a failure to make the extra point by Pierre. The rest of the quarter was dominated by Pierre Hi eleven until the last few minutes when Huron's Maxy ran 80 yd. for a touchdown and the first half ended 18 to 6.

In the third quarter Huron went over again for a touchdown and the point then the governors scored on a pass from Starkey to George Hipple who went 30 yards for a touchdown and the extra point was made. In the last quarter, Huron went to pay dirt once more and made the extra point,

to win 32 to 13.

Mr. Kleinsasser said that he was very proud of the Pierre team and I am sure we would have been if we could have been there.

Starkey and Feeney did a swell job in the backfield as did Phil Norman in the line. Pierre will finish the season against Winner and Gettysburg.

PIERRE LOSES TO WINNER

Winner beat Pierre for the first time in quite a while. Pierre had a great loss when Feeney was hurt on the third play of the game and then Lindenkugel was lost later.

The Winner team scored consecutively in the 1st 2nd and 3rd quarters and followed with an extra point after each. Pierre's first touchdown was made in the third quarter by G. Norman and the point was missed. Then in the fourth quarter Starkey passed to Sage for a touchdown and the point attempt failed. The game ended 21 to 12.

Pierre will be meeting Gettysburg for its final game and I think we can take them. Let's hope!

The Gettysburg Battlers, who were conference leaders were defeated by the Pierre Governors 27 to 0. The Governors took early lead when the Battlers failed to get off their kick and Pierre team took the ball on the thirty to go over for a touchdown with nice runs by Starkey and Norman doing the job. The extra point was made.

The next two were made under similar conditions when the Battlers got off two bad kicks. Sage made the first of these while Starkey made the second. The extra point was added to each. Gettysburg who had showed little life pepped up a little and held Pierre to one touchdown made on a pass by Starkey to Hipple. Extrapoint was missed.

The last half was an unscored one for both teams. Gettysburg did advance deep into our territory, but were halted.

I would like to give special recognition to the seniors who played their last game for Pierre. They are: Jack Starkey, Tom Corcoran, Ruglus Grabo, Phil Norman and John Berry and also those who could not play because of injuries and sickness; Chuck Lindenkugel and Marshall Miller. Everyone of them played a swell game and we are sure going to miss them next year.
