

A fighting Pierre team nearly upset the Rapid City homecoming game. Had it not been for a touchdown in the last five seconds of the game, this upset would have been complete.

Rapid made its first touchdown in the first few minutes of the game on a long end run. Pierre, after missing some touchdown chances, finally came back in last minutes of the second quarter on a pass to Lindekugel. Pierre followed Rapid in missing the extra point.

On an off-tackle run from the fourteen yard-line, Starkey made a touchdown in the third quarter. G. Norman made the extra point on a plunge. On a beautiful punt by Lindekugel, Pierre felt fairly safe in the last few minutes of the game, but Rapid came back with a touchdown in the final seconds of the game, adding the extra point to tie the game.
