STUDENTS WRITE FINAL SDU SCHOLARSHIP TESTS





IPSWICH AND CANISTOTA SHARE CLASS B HONORS

Three records fell as thirty schools competed in the annual Pierre Legion Relays held at Hollister Field, April 17.

George Isaac of Freeman heaved the discus 135 feet 11 inches, bettering the records of 130 feet 10 inches set by Guhin, of Aberdeen in 1943.

The Wolsey Class B two-mile relay team ran the event in 9:04.9, clipping 16 seconds off the old mark.

Another record was erased as the Ipswich Sprint-medley Class B squad came through with a time of 3:52.3.

Michaelson turned in a 10 second performance in the 100-yard dash event, tying the state meet record, Lindbloom placed second. Pierre's half-mile relay team also placed first.

Huron went far ahead of the other schools to win the Class A division with 32 points. Pierre placed second. Ipswich and Canistota tied for top honors on the Class B competition.
