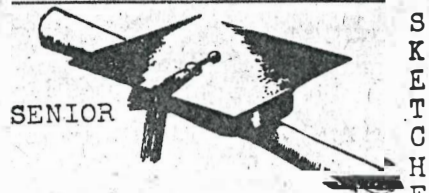

The Pierre Governors defeated the Ipswich Tigers 39-28 for their second conference victory.

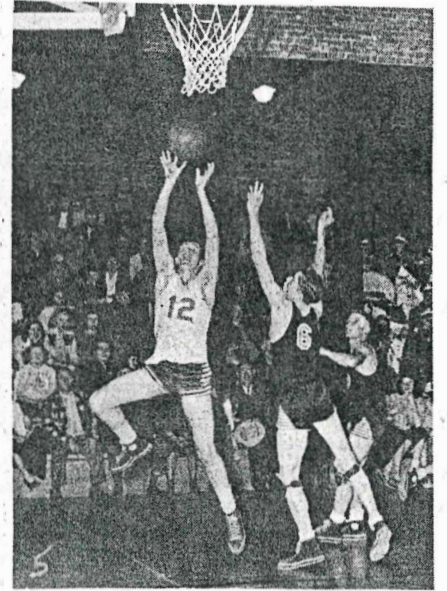
The Governors took the lead in the opening minutes of play, and built it up to an eight point margin when the half ended.

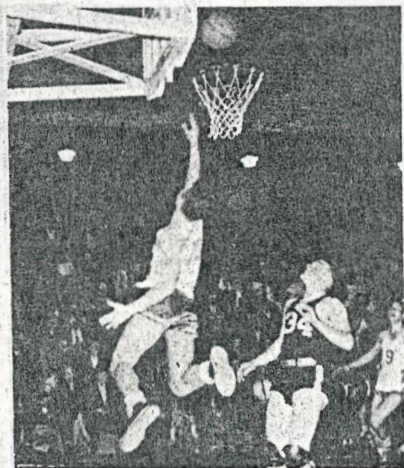
BEES WIN ONE DROP TWO
