The Speaker of the evening was Mrs. R. B. Hipple, who spoke to the group on Journalism.

A meeting was held after the initiation ceremonies, and this year's officers were elected. They are as follows: Ann Hoffman, President, Winifred Russell, Vice President, and Ruth Kempter, Secretary-Treasurer.

The organization hopes to accomplish a great deal this year as far as practicing journalism is concerned. At the present time, they have contributed several interesting articles to the "Capitol Journal."

Pierre and Huron emerged victors in the Division 5 Meet held in Huron March 3, and therefore, will compete in the State Debate Tournament in Huron March 22. John Murphy and Ruth Kempter will uphold the affirmative and Jim Robbins and Anne Hoffmann the negative.

The State Meet will culminate a successful season for the ten man debate squad. Other members besides those already mentioned are: Ann Strayer, Wesgate Swafford, Ann Wilkinson, Robert Landes, Jack Barnes, and Jerry Miller. Winning 18 and losing 10 debates throughout the season, they tied for fourth place at the Huron Invitational, took first place at the Vivian Tourney, and defeated Vivian again in a dual-meet. Pierre was represented in Extemporaneous Speaking by Wesgate Swafford and in Original Oratory by Ann Strayer. Ann placed second in the divisional meet, Wesgate ranked third.

SCHOOL PURCHASES NEW EQUIPMENT

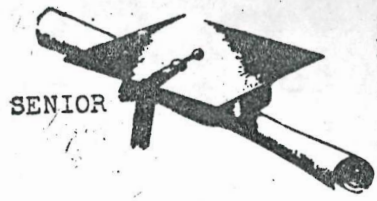
The Pierre School System purchased two movie projectors in the past week. One will be used in the grade schools, and the other for Junior and Senior High Schools.

PIERRE SHARPSHOOTERS PLACE

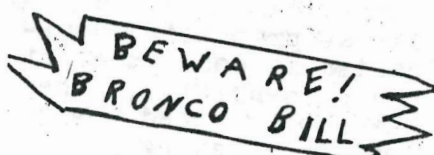

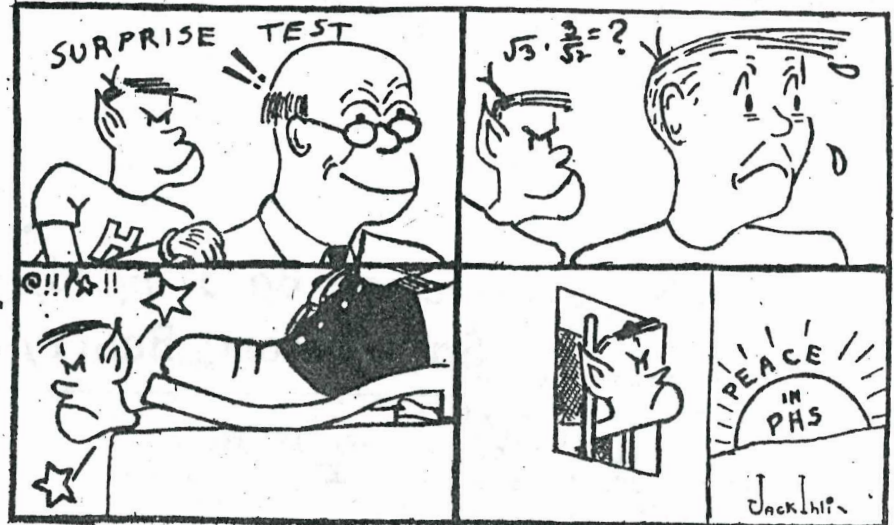

The quartet presented a well rounded program and their arranger-pianist Paul Velucci rendered two piano solos.

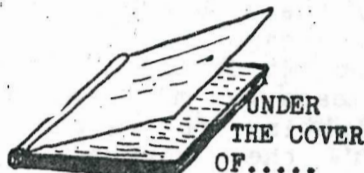
