Local Students Named Semi-Finalists

Gilbert Neiles, principal of the Theodore F. Riggs Senior High School, announced today that two local students have been named Semifinalists in the 1959-60 National Merit Scholarship competition. They are Mike Isenberg and Vynn Walter.

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The local students are among 10,000 of the highest scorers on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, the nation-wide test of educational development given in over 145,000 high schools last spring. The Semifinalists named today out-

The Semilinalists named today out-scored over 550,000 classmates and thus moved a step closer to the goal of all winning one of the coveted Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the 1959-60 Program. The group of 10,000 Semi-finalists are composed of the highest scorers in each state, prorated accord-

ing to state population.

The Semifinalists now face another rigorous three-hour examination, the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board, which will further confirm their high scores on the NMSQT. This second test will be given in testing center throughout the U.S. on December 5, 1959. Those who repeat their high scores on this second test will become Finalists in the competition.

John M. Stalnaker, President of National Merit Scholarship Corporation which conducts the annual Program predicts that over 95 per-cent of Semifinalists will get past the second hurdle-the December 5th examination-and become Finalists.

"Each year we are delighted with e caliber of youngsters who become Semifinalists in the academic competi-tion conducted by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. They are the products of American homes and American schools, and the whole nation is proud of them. Our goal is to help all of the Finalists through our own all of the Finalists through our own resources and with the aid of others to enter college next fall. The Merit Program has been praised by many, but it could never accomplish its objectives without the sympathetic coopera-tion of the nation's secondary school administrators, declared Mr. Stalnake.
As Finalists, the students will be

eligible for scholarship awarus spon-sored by an estimated 100 business and industrial organizations, professional societies, foundations, individuals, and the National Merit Scholarship Corporation itself, which conducts the annual nation-wide competition. Merit Scholarship sponsors have included such nationally-known names as The Sears-Roebuck Foundation, International Business Machines Corporation, Shell Companies Foundation, Inc., National Distillers and Chemical Corporation, The Lilly Endownment Inc., Arkansas Opporunity Fund, The B.F. Goodrich Fund Inc. The UpJohn Company, Edwin T. Meredith Foundation, F.M. Woolworth Company, Time Incorporate, and many others.

All Finalists will receive Certificates of Merit attesting to their high ability; and all colleges and universities will be notified thus universities will be notified thus enabling these students to be considered for a wide range of other awards. Studies made of an earlier Program revealed that more than 40 per-cent of the Finalist group were helped directly or indirectly in obtaining scholarship

assistance.

The colleges chosen by the Merit Scholars in most instances also receive

scholars in most instances also receive cost-of-education grants ranging to \$500 per year to help defray the actual costs of educating the students. In the final phase of the competition, high school grades, extracurricular activities, school citizenship and leadership qualities of the students will be evaluated along with the scape. will be evaluated along with the score

on the tests.

About May 1, 1960, the names of the Merit Scholars will be announced, the exact number depending on the degree of sponsor support of the Merit .Pro-
