Distributive Education began in 1936 with the passage of the George-Dean Act by which the federal government makes money available to states for such a pro-

All of the students participating in D.E. this year, have formed a local chapter of DECA, Distributive Education Clubs of America. The members of DECA will study marketing and distribution in connection with their club, and will also "help to promote understanding and appreciation for the responsibilities of citizenship in our free, competitive enterprise system."
