a half-hour later than last year. Teachers are on duty at 8:00, allowing time for the student to seek additional out-of-class help. The student body is divided into


sections A, B, and C for lunch, according to their 4th hour class. The day is over at 2:55, with a half-hour more allotted for extra-

The enrollment in Pierre Public Schools has increased 45 students since last year's enrollment.

Rigg's shows a 13 student increase. The Senior class has 202 students this year and 203 students in 66-67. Juniors have 234 students this year, with 203 juniors last year. The Sophomore class have 226 students this year, with 233 sophs last year. Riggs had 649 students last year, with 662 this year.

Junior High School shows a 15 student increase. The 9th grade have 241 students this year and 225 students last year. The 8th grade class has 232 students this year and only 228 last year. The 7th grade had 228 students during the 1966-67 year and the 7th grade class this year has 231. Junior High has a total of 704 this year,

with a total of 689 last year. The grade schools have a total

of 1443 students. Last year there was a total of 1426.
