Popcorn finances foreign student at Riggs

The Riggs High language room seems to be overflowing with popcorn lately.

Spanish club and Spanish students are selling popcorn to finance a South American student at Riggs High next semester. Maria Almeida, an Uruguayan girl will come to Pierre under the Amity Institute program.

Under the Amity program young people, ages 21 to 35, come to the U.S. mainly to learn the English language. It is much like the Peace Corp in reverse. Amity requires that Maria work for three hours a day in school and two hours on her own program. Mrs. Leach will supervise her schedule.

Amity does not finance the trip. It simply selects and places applicants. Those selected must pay their own way to the U.S. The group that sponsors the student must pay the transportation from their point of entry to the location of the sponsors. The school board is paying for Maria's transportation and Spanish Club is providing \$10 a week for her spending money. The popcorn sale is one of the projects the club has undertaken to raise the needed money.

The purpose of this first interschool exchange at Riggs high is to allow a sharing of ideas and course offerings between the schools, as well as making for a weeklong change of pace for four Riggs' students.

Shop and Ag students make move to new building

Mr. Grey, vocational agriculture instructor, received for his birthday, Nov. 20, the privilege of moving into the new vocational education building at Riggs High School.

The new rooms are occupied by vocational agriculture, upholstery, carpentry and woodworking classes. Besides the two large shop areas, there are two class rooms and two offices for the four teachers who use the new facility.

Mr. Evenson, Mr. Grey, Mr. Schumacher and Mr. Venner are the instructors who have classes in the new

building.

The agriculture department now has its own shop area which will allow for expansion of agriculture activities. Formerly those students shared the shop area with Mr. Clough and Mr. Hoing. The woodworking classes have a larger area for work and a separate room for upholstery and finishing work. A large concrete area in the front of the building will permit outside shop work in good weather, as well as a hard surface entrance.

Riggs teacher wins national recognition

Dashing madly, somewhere in Riggs High School is one of the Ten Most Distinguished Young Women in the United States. She happens to be Charlotte Ann McKay Thompson.

Mrs. Thompson, who teaches in the English Department at Riggs, was chosen for the honor from a field of about 1600 women from all over the country. After the local American Association of University Women submitted her name, Mrs. Thompson was named the Outstanding Young Woman of South Dakota.

Mrs. Thompson stressed the "this was not a contest". The final decision was made on (1) past education, (2) work in her profession, (3) work on city, state and national level, and (4) future goals on present and future world problems.

Arriving in Washington, D.C., a day early, Mrs. Thompson, along with three other of the top ten women, recorded a Voice of America show to be sent to foreign countries. Among the other activities in Washington, she was awarded an engraved silver bowl at a luncheon honoring the ten recipients, which was attended by several Senators and Representatives and about 250 organization leaders. She also had several press interviews. Accompaning Mrs. Thompson in Washington was her husband, Charles.

"There was the typical confusion between North Dakota and South Dakota," according to Mrs. Thompson, when asked what people said about someone from South Dakota receiving the award.

Mrs. Thompson commented that she can't solve all of the world's problems, but she said she has two main hopes for the future. "I want to see Fine Arts recognized and funded more in high school, so it becomes considered a necessary part of life rather than an extra activity, and also equal rights for men and women. I want equal rights for all humanity."

The Governor cagers picked up their first ESD conference win Friday night when they hosted the Watertown Arrows. The victory gives Pierre a 1-2 record in loop play and a 3-2 overall.

Sparked by Bob Ashley's 25 points, the Govs swept past the Arrows, 67-59. Warren Ice sunk 15 points and Mark Washechek, also in double figures, added

10 more.

The Governors outrebounded their visitors, 31-18, and also had a better shooting percentage. Pierre shot 42 percent compared to the Arrows' 35 per cent.

Friday, December 7, Pierre travelled to Brookings where they were defeated in an overtime, 62-58. The game was tied with 40 seconds left in the overtime when the Bobcats made a field goal and two free throws. Bob Ashley led the scoring for Pierre with 31 points. Warren Ice followed with 9.
