Production wows audience

The nights of April 18, 21, and 22 were filled with the applause and laughter as the audiences at the spring play enjoyed "The Miracle Worker" in the Choir room at Riggs High.

The play, which took place in the 1880's was the story of Helen Keller, played superbly by Sue Parr, and her early lessons with her Instructress Annie Sullivan characterized by Tammy Winkler.

Assisting the two lead characters as Helen's father and mother were Pat Looby and Shelly Wooley. Aunt Ev, the sophisticated relative of the Kellers was portrayed admirably by Cindy Lenners, Annie's school, where she learned how to spell, learned the deaf alphabet, and all-around self discipline, had the characters portrayed in the form of Dr. Anagonos, Phil Looby and several blinc girls, Jayne Barton, Julie Jorgenson, Ann Michael, Gail Dunwoody and Kristy Weischedel. The son of Arthur Keller,

and Helen's brother, James, was firmly established as a major character by Roger Inman.

The servants, one adult and two children, wore black make-up to give the audience the effect of the old South. The Negros were Collete Bye as Viney, the adult, Lynne Mortenson as Martha, and Bob Neal as Percy, the latter two being the childhood playmates of Helen.

The play was headed by David Shelp, the adviser-director, and the two student directors Hyrma Zakahi and Jenny

Jorgenson.

The play had special problems in that because of the size of the choir room, the size of the audience had to be restricted. The lights were another problem because the fuses weren't big enough to house the excessive electrical load placed on them by the large theatrical lights. And the largest problem was in that over half of the actors had never before been in a high school production under Mr. Shelp.

Two Riggs seniors to join class of '79 at Westpoint

Ralph Flannery and Kevin Hipple have received official notification of appointment to the Class of 1979 at West Point, United States Military Academy.

They will be reporting to West Point, New York for orientation on July 7. They will spend four years at the Academy with a month break each summer and Christmas and spring breaks. After graduation from The Point they are required to accept a five year commission as an officer in the United States Army.

While the West Point academic system is set up in a traditional 2 semester system, there is also approximately two months every summer of participation in various activities designed to prepare them for their career as an officer.

At graduation they will be awarded a Bachelor of Science degree and a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army. To qualify for the degree cadets must complete 48 one-semester courses and physical education and military training.

The 'Queen of Crime' creates masterpiece

Murder on the Orient Express orignally published as Murder in the Calais Coach is a mystery by Agatha Christie the "Queen of Crime". Critics consider this mystery baffler to be her finest. Christie, who is the mistress of the surprise ending, has never offered a more astonishing and, as always, completely logical solution to a murder.

The story is of a three day train journey across Europe that is delayed by snowdrifts on the track. During this delay a man is brutally murdered. Since the snow outside was unbroken the murderer or murderers are thought to be still on board.

Hercule Poirot, a very well known detective, was one of the 14 passengers. As soon as the murder takes place he begins his thorough investigations into the matter. Everyone is a suspect, including himself, when a garment supposedly worn by the murderer or murderers is found in his own compartment.

He questions every passenger until he uncovers a certain kidnapping case in America with which they are all (including the murder victim) associated in one way or another. He then brings all of the suspects together and a most unusual conclusion to the murder is discovered.

If you don't take time to read the book, be sure to see the movie coming to Pierre soon, because if it is half as intriguing as the book it should be very good.

In a meet with Redfield on April 1, Pierre again took 1st, beating Redfield

with a final score of 55 to 41.
