248 seniors to receive diplomas

The largest class in the history of Riggs High School will receive their diplomas at graduation ceremonies Thursday evening, May 29 at Hollister Field. 248 seniors will be finishing their

Field. 248 seniors will be finishing their high school career this week as they participate in the traditional senior activities including a picnic, baccalaureate, practices and no classes.

Mr. Milo Wepking, admissions director at Nettleton College, Sioux Falls, is to be the commencement speaker. Mr. Wepking has been a long time supporter of high school athletics in the state and has been an official in the state "A" and "B" basketball tournaments for the past 25 years. He holds a B.S. degree from Southern State College and an M.E. degree from USD.

A 20 minute band concert will precede the commencement program beginning at 7:40 p.m. This will be the last performance for the 16 band members who are graduating.

A special choir group composed of all seniors will entertain with one number. The A Capella choir will also sing.

Tim Hofer, senior class president, will speak in behalf of his class mates. Father Ed Pierce, St. Peter and Paul Catholic Church, will lead the prayers. The sophomore-junior band will play the processional and recessional.

Special recognition will be given to the class honor students. This includes all students who have a three point (B average) or better for four years of high school. The class valedictorian and salutatorian will be named during the program.

Baccalaureate services were held

Sunday evening May 25, at the Riggs High gym with Reverend Charles Nail, Capitol Heights Baptist Church, delivering the address. Reverend Leroy

Iseminger, Ressurection Lutheran Church and Reverend Kenneth Newell, Oahe United Presbyterian Church, led the prayers.

During the final week of school, the seniors are not required to attend classes, but will meet on Wednesday for their class picnic at Farm Island, and they will spend Thursday morning practicing for commencement exercises. They will receive their final report cards at that time.

Mr. Gilbert Neiles, principal of Riggs High for 20 years, died May 1, 1975. He is still fondly remembered in the halls of Riggs since his retirement last year and no one can ever forget the things he did for the school.

Professionally I spent only three years working with Mr. Neiles but additionally I knew him for another nine years. During this friendship of some twelve years he frequently provided me with counsel and encouragement. He always took time to listen and to share his philosophy and experiences.

He was first and foremost a champion for the student. He had the personal conviction that goodness existed in everybody but sometimes it took longer to bring it out. Roger Lonbaken

As an administrator, he never lost sight of the primary purpose of an educational institution, to impart knowledge to young people. He was determined to give every opportunity for success to each individual.

Girl tracksters compete at state in Huron

Sandy Simmons was named the most outstanding competitor at the Girls State track meet in Huron May 16-17. She set a new all-time state record in the 440 yard run with a time of 57.2 took second in the 220 and was a member of the winning medley relay team.

The Pierre team tied for third at the meet with a total of 20 points. Sioux Falls Lincoln won the Class AA crown with 64 points. Rapid City Stevens was second with 28 points.

Pierre won the medley relay and set a new all-state record during prelims with a time of 1:52.3. The 880 relay took fourth at the state meet. Pierre qualified 11 girls for the state meet when they won the regional meet in Miller on May 6 with a score of 92. Winner was second wth 80, Chamberlain and Miller each earned 29 for third place.

Those competing in the state meet included Deb Hayes--mile run, Joni Opbroek-shot and discus, Deb Winkler-440 and 880 runs, Sandy Simmons-220 dash and 440 run, Melda Blake--100 yard dash, Cindy Lenners--high jump. The relay teams competing were: Medley relay, Blake, Beth Clarke, Lenners and Simmons, 440 relay, Blake, Jacque Ivers, Lenners and Clarke and the mile relay, Kristi Hoenshied, Clarke, Popowski and Winkler.

Team standings were as follows: Brookings first with 321; Huron second, 326; Aberdeen third, 332; and Yankton fourth with 337.

On May 1, the Gov's hosted a tough Onida duel on their home course. Finishing in a tie each team acquired a total of 347. Turning in scores for Pierre were Steve Bender 82, Bob Mayer 85, and Brady Marone 89.

Coach Dick Kennedy said that the team is young and inexperienced but have come a long way. He is looking for a bright future for the Pierre squad.
