The American College Testing Program (ACT) will introduce an enhanced version of the ACT Assessment Program in October.

For the past 30 years, the ACT has been regularly modified to cover the changing needs in education. The Enhanced ACT Assessment reflects recent changes that have occurred in high school curricula, and a study of critiques of American education, widely used texbooks, and advice and opinions of teachers and administrators.

The study found a need for improved information for placement and advising in English, mathematics, reading, and science.

There was also limited use of the current ACT Social Studies Reading and Natural Sciences Reading scores, so the test needed a measure of reading ability and comprehension alone.

With twelve scores instead of five, the Enhanced ACT Assessment will allow counselors and colleges to better interpret the scores that students recieve. "I'm really excited about it," said Guidance Counselor Mavis Booze. "The new test has some good improvements."

To address these needs, the Enhanced ACT will provide more precise information about a student's level of educational development by subscoring the English, Mathematics, and Reading Tests.

The English Test will have subscores: two usage/mechanics rhetorical skills. The part of the test that measures writing strategy, organization, and style has been increased. This will provide counselors and English teachers with more detailed information about student's writing skills.

The Mathmatics Test has been lengthened to 60 minutes. It's range of content has been expanded so that there are three subscores: pre-algebra/elementary algebra, intermediate algebra/coordinate geometry, plane geometry/trigonometry.

The two subscores in the new Reading Test are reading in arts/literature and reading in social studies/sciences. The test measures reading comprehension by testing skills in referring and reasoning in four prose fiction, areas: humanities, social studies, and natural sciences.

The Science Reasoning Test, which provides a single score, will indicate students' development in applying the scientific principles in basic science courses. It measures interpretation, analysis, evaluation, reasoning, and problem-solving skills required in natural sciences. The material includes questions on biology, physical sciences, chemistry, and physics.

English adds honorcourse

Honors English was offered to the seniors for the first time. The class consists of more reading and writing than the other English 12 classes. It will also contain more in-depth analysis.

"Honors English 12 offers students an opportunity to accelerate their research, composition, and literary analysis skills." said teacher Candy Birhanzel.

The course will better prepare students for research skills expected of them in college. It will also be used for advanced placement in college.


The class is made up of 15 seniors. Birhanzel said, "This year's class came in eager to learn and ready to work. This group will be a great core group for the honors program.

Angie Tedrow comments on the rest of the season,


"It's going to be a tough conference and we have got our work cut out for us. Everybody is out to win."

Center Justin Weber said that the team is "getting mentally prepared by psyching ourselves up and getting into the attitude of winning.


Quarterback Dave Ebach says, "The team has started out exceptionally well. We are running things pretty good right now, but there is still room for improvement."
