Student learns differences between Africa, America

Many people dream of taking an exciting vacation in Africa and seeing many different wild animals, but junior Sarah Zellmer's recent trip was much different.

Last month Sarah spent nineteen days in Cameroon, which is on the west coast of Africa. She, along with her father, Pastor David Zellmer of the Lutheran Memorial Church, were invited by the Evangelical Lutheran Church of South Dakota's Bishop Andrea DeGroot-Nesdahl to travel to Africa to encourage the Cameroon church to begin ordaining female pas-

It was a missionary trip to show the role that women play in faith.

"We were to put in a good word for women and their importance," said Sarah.

They were led to different churches by the bishop of the Lutheran Church in Cameroon and spoke about women being ordained.

Sarah spoke to the children, and she told what American churches and schools are like. She found out that the children are much different from American children because they are more involved in church.

"The children can't go to church through the ages of two to fourteen," said Zellmer. "It's a privilege for them, so they get more involved.

The group met with government officials for protection. Since Africa is mostly Muslim dominated, the officials wanted to make sure that the group wasn't harmed and also wouldn't cause

any problems. The officials also protected them from civilians who hated Americans. Zellmer was surprised that many Cameroon people were

supporters of Osama Bin Laden. They saw pictures of bin Laden throughout the country.

"It was shocking knowing that these people that I was around for two weeks hate Americans," said Sarah. "It's kind of scary."

Sarah was surprised that when she got off the

plane to begin her visit, she, along with her group, were the only white people to be seen. She noted that many people often stared at her.

"I was being watched by everybody because I was a white, blondehaired teenager," said Sarah.

Sarah remembers how different Africa is from America. She saw unusual things like a dead man lying next to the highway.

Sarah learned a lot from her trip with only having hot water some of the time and not having electricity.

"I learned not to take things for granted," she said. "It was a eye opener."

Honorable Mentions were earned by Jorgenson, arts review; Bixler, newswriting; and junior Pat Anderson, sports story.


Bixler was awarded second place for overall individual points.






