Students attend Native American journalism conference

Five Native American students recently attended the 8th Annual Native American Iournalism Association conference at Crazy Horse, near Custer.

Londelle Ashley, Alisha Ziegler, Charlene American Horse, TiVona Quigley and Kara Whisenant, along with their adviser Brenda Ice attended the conference along with more than 150 students from around the country.

Through combined efforts of the Freedom Forum Foundation and Crazy Horse Memorial, the conference gives young Native American students an opportunity to have a voice in journalism. This year's conference broke all attendance previous records with 163 students from states,including Washington and Alaska.

The students learned firsthand about journalism through the help of 38 volunteer journalists who came from all over the United States.

"It was fun. I got to meet new people and I learned how to interview people, write an article for newspapers, and photography. I also met Al Neuharth, founder of USA Today and the Freedom Forum Foundation. If anyone asks me if they should go, I would say 'yes,' just for the chance to learn and meet new people," said Alisha Ziegler.

Students had a chance to learn how to write for a newspaper saw firsthand what a photographer and a reporter do, interviewed other students and staff mission to the news-






