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## the news: senior receives statewide honors

Being in many activities can be stressful at times, but at the end of the day, senior Casey Ortbahn finds it hard to imagine what life would be like without them.

Ortbahn is involved with many activities and has been recognized by the community and the state.

He was recently selected for All State Band and chosen one of 12 Academic All Stars in the state by the Argus Leader. He was featured in a special section of the Argus that ran on Sunday, April 6.

"In order to become an Academic All Star, you have to be selected by the principal of your school and then make it past a selection committee in Sioux Falls," Ortbahn said.

Eighty-six dents from South Dakota were nominated for the award, but only 12 were selected.

"In order to apply for it, I had to write an essay, I had to have a transcript, and I had to send in my resume as well," Ortbahn said.

"You can get scholarship money, and if you are going to USD or SDSU, it allows you a full-ride scholarship. You can earn a \$12,500 scholarship to Augustana too," said Ortbahn.

It is a huge honor to be selected an Academic All Star, and it shows knowledge and commitment to the others in the community.

"I was pretty surprised when I won. It is such an honor to know that what you do is being recognized by the community and others around you," Ortbahn said.

Another recent honor was Ortbahn's selection for All state band, a challenging process that is very competitive. The first step is to try out in front of judges. The tryouts include scales and sight reading.

"It was such an honor to win All State Band because I worked really hard for it, and I was the only one from Pierre to get it," Ortbahn said.

This year's concert was in Sioux Falls. The two bands that play are the Lewis band and the Clark band. The Lewis band is made up of the top players who tried out.


"I played in the Lewis band, and I was the sixth chair for the horn," Ortbahn said.

# Juniors to be granted open campus privileges

Juniors will gain a new freedom for the final four weeks of school.

Principal Leroy Fugitt and other school officials have decided that juniors who have met the requirements will gain an open that has no limits, unlike the current inhouse opens, which require juniors to stay on school grounds and to check in and out with the study hall teacher.

To gain this new privilege, juniors must not be failing any classes, have no unexcused absences, and have few tardies.

"We're going to try these opens for the last fourweeks, and depending on how it goes, that will influence whether we do it next year for an extended period of time," Fugitt said.

This new privilege will give juniors a time to relax before their next class or possibly reserve time for a little extra sleep in the morning or after classes for those students who have first period or seventh period open.

"It's legit--I'm going to enjoy sleeping in first period," junior Josh Baker said.

These opens will also give study hall teachers who have a full study hall coinciding with an in-house open decreased stress in not having to supervise both.

"It will help me lighten the work load by not having to be responsible for two classes," art/study hall teacher Alicia Roesler said.

How the juniors handle the freedom of their opens will decide if the juniors next year will have the same opportunities, Fugitt said. Working hard throughout the year and excelling in classes may give students the privilege of an open campus period.

# It's time to set juniors free

As students grow into young adults, they begin learning how to take care of themselves and don't need to be babysat anymore.

Junior in-house opens have been around for a couple years, but the productiveness of the students during these opens has never been very high, especially with new computers to play games on. Starting soon, juniors in good academic and disciplinary standing will earn open campus on a trial basis.


Certainly, it has been a constant struggle for the study-hall teachers to monitor the juniors in the lounge along with their own study hall kids in the cafeteria. Some niors just play games the whole time, others skip out completely and show up just in time for the next period.

Study-hall ers do not want to enforce junior in-house opens, and juniors do not want to stay "inhouse," so isn't it a win-win situation?

The opens should be given as a type of reward system. If a student is struggling with grades, attendance, or behavior, then he or she should be in regular study hall. But if students are behaving well and doing well in school, let them have opens. This is just a way of letting the kids who want to do homework, do their homework in a quieter environment with fewer distractions.

On top of scholastics, some juniors want to earn a little money. With an open at the end of the day, it is nice to be able to get an extra hour of work in.

The school needs to focus more on im-



proving the experience of students in actual study halls. Instead of giving one teacher an unrealistic number of students to look after in the cafeteria and the lounge, this decision will allow them to focus exclusively on the students in study hall.

Open campus could also be extra motivation to those kids who are struggling. If they have sub-par grades, they will work harder so they can have opens. After all is said and done, giving juniors opens is the most sensible thing to do in this situation.

The school is lacking the space to house the juniors and the teachers to monitor them adequately, so just let them go. If kids aren't mature enough by their junior year of high school to handle the freedom, then they should not be treated as upperclassmen.

The world is looking to be environmentally friendly in every aspect of people's lives, and this means looking for greener alternatives in the production of food, fiber, fuel, medicine, and building products. Two alternative crops that we can be optimistic about are bamboo and hemp.

Many people are familiar with the hemp plant, but most likely not familiar with its wide variety of uses. Hemp is a weed that is able to thrive in harsh conditions without use of harmful pesticides. The fibers of the stalk can be used as a replacement or a blender fiber for cot-

ton, and with the plant growing over ten feet tall, it is the perfect length for rope. The core of the stalk can also be used to make paper and organic plastics. The stalk can even be used to make methanol and ethanol.

Hempseed contains high levels of protein, carbohydrates, fiber, vitamins, and essential fatthe seeds' weight, makcooking oil, lighting and bio-fuel. Hempseed oil is also beneficial as a body care product and can be made into soaps, conditioners, and lotions.

If you have a 12 gallon tank in your car, it will cost you about \$42.00 fill it with gas. But, if you filled your gas tank with bottled water, it would cost you about \$81.40. Still, you don't hear anyone complaining about the prices of water when many people buy it on a daily basis.

Some of the biggest bottlers of water, like Dasani and Aquafina, simply bottle purified water, not water from a well or spring which is often advertised. Yes, this water is purified, but this also means that it does not contain min-

erals like fluoride which keep your teeth healthy.

Another negative about bottled water is the waste products produced by the plastic bottles and

the shipping. It is estimated that over 10 million barrels of oil are used just in the production of the

water,
plus the fuel it takes
to ship the bottles.

Americans throw away somewhere around 22 billion water bottles each year; that is over 60 million each day. A whopping 80% of these bottles wind up in landfills and take up to 1000 years to biodegrade.

If you're like me, you don't enjoy support-

ing the corporate giants and most certainly do not enjoy being ripped off.

Production costs of bottling

water can be as low as \$.0125 per gallon, and you'll pay \$1.06 for less than 1/6 of that gallon. Bottled water can cost up to 10,000 times more than drinking water from

a tap, and for most high school and college students, it costs 100% more because we have access to free water most places we go.

Not drinking bottled water will help your teeth, your wallet, and most importantly Mother Earth. One way to eliminate the purchasing of bottled water is by buying a bottle that you can carry with you and reuse.

A Nalgene bottle costs about \$9.00 but will quickly pay for itself with the money you save from not buying bottled water. Fill up your bottle at home and at a drinking fountain when you can.

Mother Earth will thank you.



hopefully, And Mother Nature will cooperate just a little bit for the rest of the season.




Focusing on the hole, junior Taylor Smalley prepares to putt the ball during a tournament.




also be showing their work this weekend at the Short Grass Arts Council's show here in Pierre.
