"I really like the



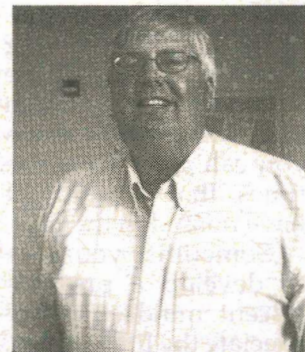
good kids here at Riggs and definitely the outdoors," said Seamands.

You might actually surprise yourself and have a good time.

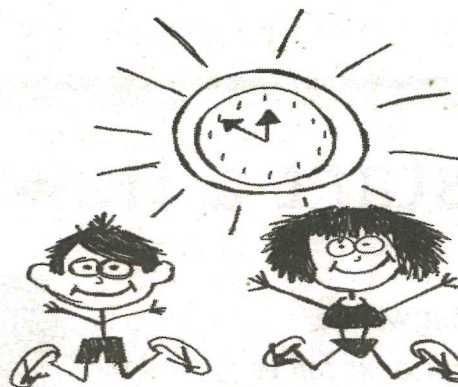

Columnists' major league baseball predictions

Basketball--The USA has a very good chance to dominate the Olympic Games this summer in Beijing. The roster is as close as it gets to the Original Dream Teams of the late 80's and early 90's, when the USA had Michael Jordan, Larry Bird, and Magic Johnson. The team that the USA will have to look out for on its run to the gold medal will be Argentina, who has Manu Ginobili (Spurs) and Andres Nocioni (Bulls). **Swimming**--The swimming events will be surrounded by controver-

sy this year as the IOPC has decided to allow the new Speedo Razor swimsuit to be used in competition. Since the suit came out earlier this year, it has broken numerous world records. Swimmers say it creates more buoyancy, and they feel like they swimming on top

of the water. The USA obviously features an incredible athlete in Michael Phelps. At the 2004 Summer Olympics, Phelps earned eight total medals for the USA, six of which were gold. As of 2007, Phelps has a total of twenty-three world records for different events in swimming. He should be solid. For the women, Amanda Beard will be a for-sure medal winner. She specializes in the 100m and 200m breaststroke. Beard won a gold medal at the 2004 Games for the USA in

the 200m breaststroke. **Track and Field**--The track competitions will also have controversy as the IOPC has decided to not allow amputees to compete in the Olympics. This may seem like a non-factor, but a double amputee from South Africa has come close to setting Olympic qualifying times. He has been banned because the IOPC determined that his prosthetics gave him an unfair advantage over the other runners.

Tyson Gay of the USA is a possible favor-

ite for the 100m dash. Gay has not competed in the Olympics before but has won the World Outdoor Championships for the 100m and 200m dashes in 2007. Gay could also be a runner on the USA's 4x100 relay team. Gay has a 9.84 second 100m dash time and a 19.62 200m dash time.

For the women, Alison Felix is the USA's best sprinter. She holds the record for the 200m dash at the USA team trials from the 2004 Olympics with a time of 22.98 seconds.

Baseball/Softball--The USA is always famous for their women's softball team. Look for them to bring home another medal this year as they are predicted to be one of the top teams. Pitcher Jennie Finch is a veteran and has already won one gold medal with Team USA.

For the men, the baseball team features all college players, since the MLB players will be in their regular season. Hopefully the younger bunch of guys can play well and bring home a medal

Boys and Girls track prepare for state meet

The weather is getting warmer (theoretically), the grass is getting greener, the trees are budding, and love is in the air. This can only mean one thing. Summer is coming? No. Seniors are graduating and leaving high school forever? No. These signs can only point toward the one thing on everybody's mind--the state track meet.

As two-time defending champions of the Boys AA State Track & Field Meet, the Governors are pumped and ready to go.

Led by returning individual champions, senior Travis Fitzke, junior Matt Tetzlaff, and junior Jarrett Klinger, the boys from Pierre are among the favorites to win the State Meet held in Brandon Valley and Sioux Falls on May 23 and 24.

Fitzke, who won the

State Cross-Country Meet in the fall, is eyeing the 1600M and 800M races as his chance to win, knows that his stiffest competition will come from Bill Kogel of Sioux Falls Roosevelt.

"Kogel is a solid runner, and he's won a couple of events recently, but I am looking forward to the challenge of going up against the fastest in the state," Fitzke said.

Tetzlaff, who won the 110M hurdles his freshman and sophomore year and also won the 300M hurdles his sophomore year, knows he just needs to run his race and not worry about anyone else to claim another title.

Klinger, who won the 100M and 200M dash last year, looks to repeat in both of these events.

The key to winning state championships is to have strong individual finishes but also to complement

those with solid efforts from the relay teams.

"It's really important for the whole team to pull together and strive for the goal of a championship. One or two people can't do it by themselves; everyone has to contribute," senior Sean Melmer said.

The medley relay team will consist of Klinger, Melmer, sophomore Jacob Parsons, and junior Alec Espeland. The 4x4 relay team will include Espeland, junior Bryce Drapeaux, junior Dillon Paulsen, and Fitzke. Both of these teams won at the track-o-rama in Rapid City earlier this year.

Sometimes overshadowed by the recent success of the boys is the girls track team.

Lead by a core group of seniors, the girls team also has a promising future with strong runners in the younger grades.

The perfect demonstration of this mix of

talent was at the ESD Conference tournament on Monday held in Huron. The girls that won the four by one hundred meter relay were junior Alexa Berg, senior Morgan McClain, and freshmen Taylor Larson and Jordyn Anderson.

But the four by one relay team wasn't the only relay to do well as the 800M relay team took second place behind Watertown.

Alexa Berg also set a school record with a time of 15.01 in the 100M hurdles on her way to a second place finish while Jordyn Anderson finished in third place in the 100M dash.

The runners weren't the only girls to shine. The field athletes also had a strong showing. Steph Paluch added points by placing third in the triple jump with a jump of 34 feet 4.25 inches. This total team effort of the girls earned them a fourth place fin-

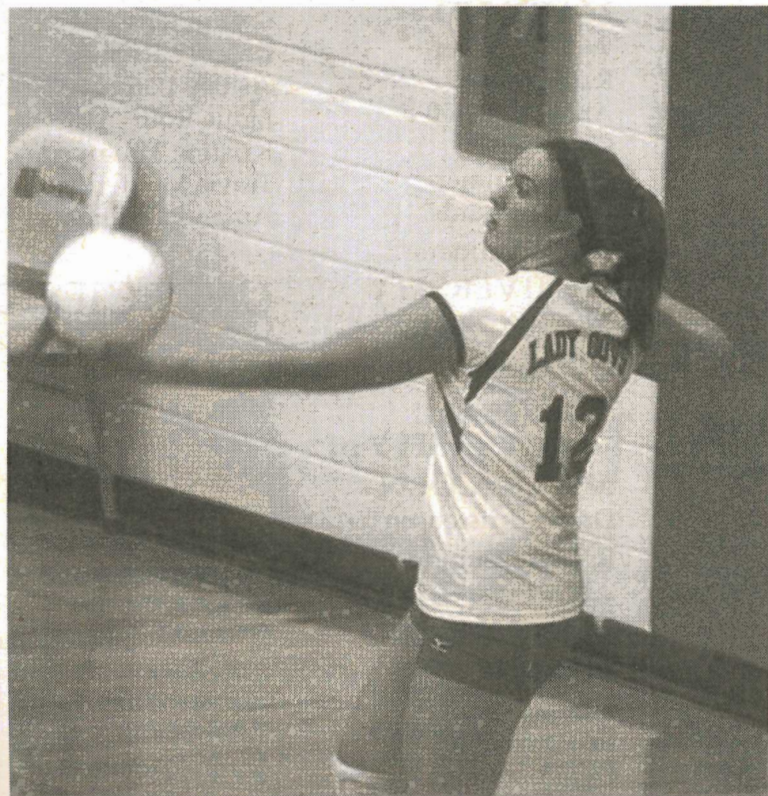
"I'm very excited to continue on in my athletic career at a great school like NDSU," Fitzke said.
