Travel conditions, weather determine snow days

It is a weekday, and the wind chill is -50 degrees, snow drifts are being whipped by wild winds into 10-foot barriers, and the air is dense with blowing snow. Chances are that students in Pierre will be sitting in a classroom and not snug at home, wrapped in a quilt and watching a movie. The recent spate of blizzards and icy cold weather caused numerous school closings across the state, making it seem that Pierre was the only school district still open and operating. What kind of weather does it take for the Pierre School District to declare a snow day?

Many factors play a part in the decision to cancel or delay the start of school days, said Dr. Kelly Glodt, superintendent of schools for the Pierre School District. The process of making those decisions is much

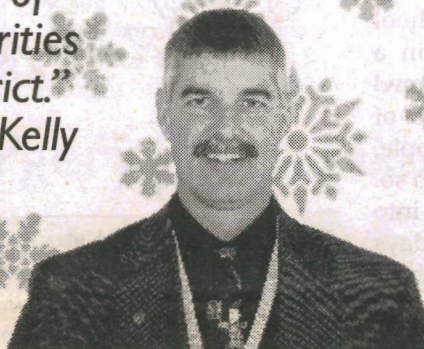
more complicated than most would suspect. Current weather, travel conditions, and forecasted weather conditions are all taken into consideration.

Pierre is unique in the fact that it does not provide transportation. If we had multiple bus routes traveling significant distances, the district's philosophy would certainly be altered. High school principal Leroy Fugitt added that conditions that make travel difficult for large numbers of students and staff play a part in the decision. Since most students and staff live in town or nearby, those conditions making school impossible are rather rare as opposed to rural districts and those that transport students by bus.

The final decision, however, is made by Glodt.

"I do not make that decision without the input of other critical staff members. Dan Frost, director of buildings

and grounds, and his crew begin removing snow, applying ice melt, etc. around 4:00 a.m. They are in contact with the city, county, and state officials throughout the process and as deemed necessary. If there is any question about canceling school or starting late, Dan contacts me around 5:00 a.m., and we discuss the current conditions of the rural and city roads, as well as school parking lots," Glodt said.

In assessing the weather, the school district does not have a set policy

on how cold is too cold to have school. There is no established wind chill limit; it is only one of the many factors used in making the decision, said Glodt.

Some factors unique to Pierre that play a role in the school cancellation decision include the city's role as the center of the State of South Dakota government offices and the fact that the school district does not transport any students.

"[The seat of state government] is certainly one of the many factors we take into consid-

eration but is definitely not a primary factor," Glodt said. "Providing a safe environment for our students is one of our greatest priorities as a school district. We certainly do not want any student/parent to take unnecessary risks in getting to school because the conditions in town compared to rural areas are often very different," Glodt added.

The Pierre School District has left that decision up to parents for many years. The building principals have the authority to ex-

cuse students who are tardy or absent due to inclement weather conditions.

"One could argue that more students would be walking to school if we were to make the decision to start school late. While many parents are able to drop off their children prior to going to work, a number of them may not be able to leave work to give their child/children a ride later in the morning," Glodt said.

If the blizzard fairy comes during the early morning and causes NO SCHOOL in Pierre to roll across the bottom of the television screen, there is generally room within the school calendar to replace the missed day. Fugitt said that the decision is one made by the district's Board of Education. The missed day could be made up on either a remaining vacation day or at the end of the school year.

If icy streets or miserable weather cause a student to be late, the high school administration does have a different attitude towards the tardy sweeps policy.

"We have granted extended time for first period tardies due to weather conditions on five occasions since tardy sweeps were re-instituted," Fugitt said.

Before shedding your fuzzy jammies the next frigid morning, the best way to find out if school has been cancelled is to check your home phone. The school district uses a new automated phone system called School Reach, said Fugitt.

In addition, announcements are made on designated local radio and television stations. Every household with a working phone number would be contacted with a message from the superintendent.

than three inches in front of your vehicle, you'd think that the district would call a snow day. Seriously, schools in Texas have been called off due to frost. FROST.

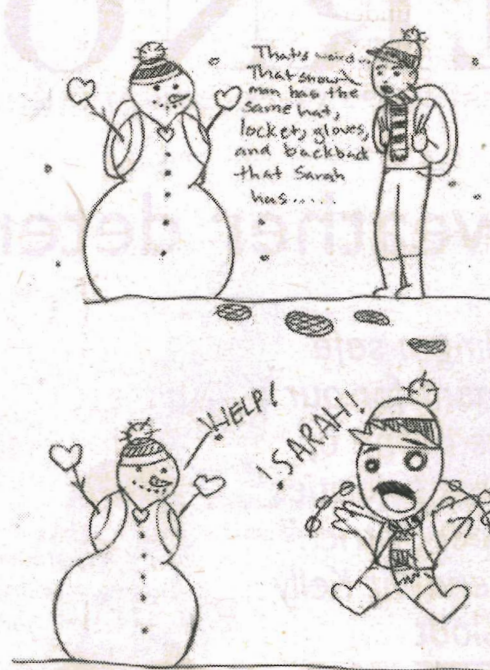
Pierre schools don't close down for anything...ever. Armageddon could be upon us, and we'd still have a school day. (Good luck, Class of 2012!) Probably

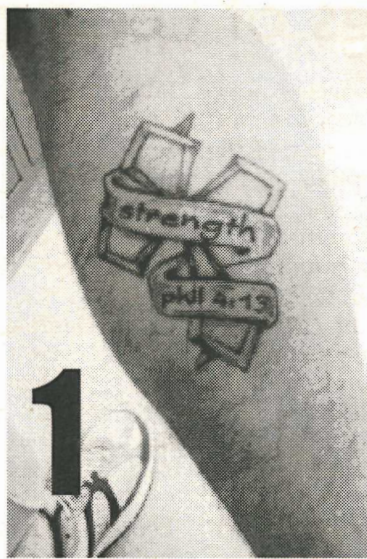

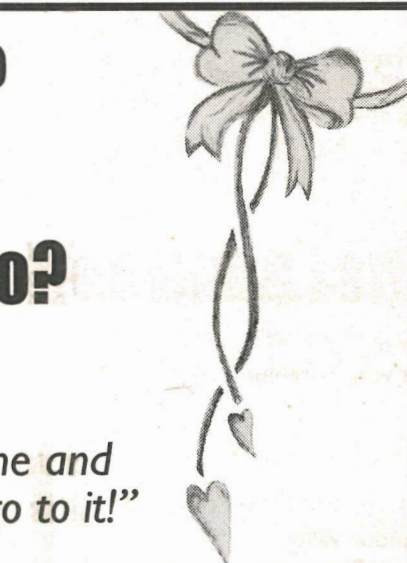
"INK STINKS! That's what I think!" senior Adam McMath exclaims.
