A lot has happened in these first weeks of May. Beyoncé released an extremely controversial album titled 'Lemonade', speculators find evidence that Prince may have died because of a drug addiction, and Captain America: Civil War finally came to theaters, making 182 million dollars opening weekend.

On Friday, May 6th, 26-year-old professional soccer player Patrick Ekeng from Cameroon (West Africa) collapsed during a game in Bucharest, Romania. He was

rushed to the hospital, only to be proclaimed dead. Local media has announced that he suffered from a heart attack, but did not receive any first aid at the stadium.

North Korea is holding the first meeting of North Korea's Workers' Party since 1980. Kim Jong-un is expected to talk about his nuclear plans. Foreign reporters have been let into the country for this event, but are not allowed in the building where the meetings are being held.

The Fort McMur-

Govs Finish Up Another Winning Year

Over the past few years, Pierre has become accustomed to being a powerhouse in both the Eastern South Dakota Conference and in Class AA as a whole and the 2015-2016 sports seasons have been no exception. Throughout the year, the Governors and Lady Govs have competed and found success in nearly every sport.

The fall sports season began in late August with football dominating the headlines. The football season would become a record-breaking year for the Governors. They reached the state championship game for the second three in three years on the back of stellar defensive play and senior leadership. The Governors lost a heartbreaking game at the Dakota Dome against Yankton on a failed two-point conversion attempt. After the season finished, however, three of the Governor football players signed on to play football in college. At a shared ceremony, Brevin Kaiser, quarterback/defensive back, Layne Hohn, running back/linebacker, and Zach Strand, wide receiver/defensive back, signed to play at the University of South Dakota, Dakota Wesleyan, and University of Sioux Falls respectively. The biggest news of the offseason for the Governors football program came when head coach Jayson Poppinga announced his resignation from teaching and coaching positions at T.F. Riggs. Poppinga will be moving to Sioux Falls where he has accepted a position to be the next head football coach at O'Gorman High School where he will also teach science. On the greens, the boys' golf team found their way to a fifth place finish with a total team score of 649.

The winter season for the Governors was accompanied by another championship season by the Governors' wrestling team. It was the fourth state championship for the Governors in five years. The wrestlers qualified wrestlers for the state meet at every weight class. At the state meet, three wrestlers winning their weight class led the Governors. Jebben Keyes won at 132 lbs. for his third consecutive title. Twin brothers Will and Lincoln Turman won titles at 106 and 113 lbs. The team fell just short of the top total points total at a single state meet, but felt that a state championship was an adequate way to cap the season. The boys' basketball team found success on the hardwood as they won the district tournament and finished fourth at the state tournament held at the Denny Sanford Premier Center in Sioux Falls.

The spring has gone well for the Governors and Lady Govs. The track and field teams competed at what is arguably the biggest meet on their schedule when they competed at Howard Wood Relays in Sioux Falls on May 6-7. On the boys' side, Max Reinke threw his way to a third place finish in the shotput with a throw of 53'7" and the 4x800 relay finished third in Class AA. On the girls' side, Cortney Dowling continued her stellar track career with a 2nd place finish in the 200m special event at Howard Wood. The track teams have their state meet on May 27-28 in Sioux Falls. Tennis' state meet is May 19-21 in Rapid City. The girls' golf state meet is June 6-7 at Lakeview Golf Course in Mitch-

As a whole, the 2015-2016 sports season has been an eventful time for the Governors and Lady Govs. Multiple titles across multiple sports has become the norm in Pierre and there seems to be no way to stop it. So fans, keep making a ruckus! Athletes, keep winning! And Pierre, as always, bleed green!
