Riggs Standout Drafted in MLB Draft

Peyton Zabel, the name more than likely sounds familiar if you follow South Dakota high school athletics. From the football and baseball field to the basketball court Zabel did it all. Zabel who graduated from T.F Riggs in the spring of 2018 committed to play football and baseball at Augustana University.

The three-sport athlete who excelled at all football, basketball, and baseball turned heads throughout his time here at Riggs. Zabel who led

the Post 8 Baseball team to a state championship in 2017 and the T.F. Riggs High School Football team to an 11AA football championship was announced the 11AA football player of the year, class A baseball player of the year, as well as the 11AA basketball player of the year. As his time as a high school athlete came to an end, he got more than just college coaches' attention.

Zabel's size, athletic ability, and leadership caught the eye of professional baseball coaches. As Zabel led the Riggs

High School Spring Baseball team to their fifth straight appearance in the state high school tournament, professional coaches were flocking to him.

The Milwaukee Brewers had a pitching scout watching Zabel throughout the state tournament. As the professional scout was impressed with Zabel's ability to pitch and hit the ball. The right-handed pitcher clocked out with a 93-mph fastball during the tournament and striking out 16 batters in his last start at the state tournament.

The 2018 MLB Draft

approached in early June and all eyes were on the Brewers and Zabel; as many expected the Brewers to select the young athlete. The Milwaukee Brewers did select Peyton Zabel with the 575th pick in the 19th round of the draft. When asked about the feeling of being selected in the MLB Draft as an eighteen-year-old who just graduated high school Zabel said, "It was a dream come true, it was a very humbling experience and I learned a lot through the process."

Unlike many 18-year-

olds, Zabel had to now decide whether he would enroll at Augustana to play college athletics or play professional baseball for the Brewers. After a long thought process, Zabel decided to attend Augustana and forgo the professional offer. Zabel stated, "I really liked the people at Augustana and it felt like it was the place for me to be." Since Zabel opted to enroll at a four-year university he will be eligible for the MLB draft in three years. We wish Peyton the best of luck in his collegiate career at Augustana!

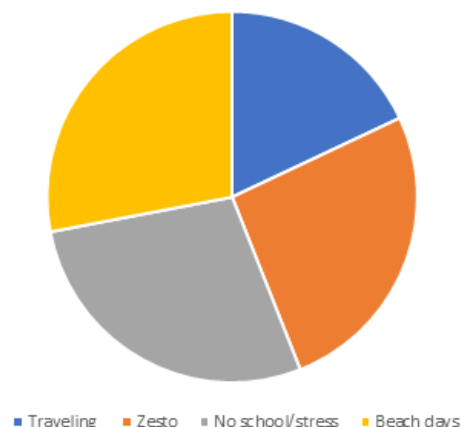

Who's on the Ballot?

It is a big election year for South Dakota. Both our Governor and Congressional races are very highly contested. South Dakotans have the opportunity to elect the first woman governor in South Dakota history. Kristi Noem is running as the Republican candidate, whereas Billie Sutton is running as the Democrat. Both Sutton and Noem have experience in state government. Sutton has served in the State Senate for eight years and is now stepping down to run for governor. Noem is our current congresswoman and has served two terms as a State representative. In 2010 she ran for the US House of Representative seat and has served three terms in the US house. That now leaves the position open.

South Dakota has two qualified candidates running for this office, Dusty Johnson running as a Republican and Tim Bjorkman running as a Democrat. South Dakota only has one seat in the US house, so it is very important that South Dakota elects the most qualified

and capable candidate to hold this seat. Bjorkman has his own private law practice, in November of 2006, he was elected to be a Judge for the First Judicial Circuit in South Dakota.

Johnson served as one of the three Public Utility Commissioners in South Dakota before he was asked to step down and become

the Chief of Staff for Governor Dennis Daugaard in 2011. He is the former State Advisor for the South Dakota Teenage Republicans (TARS) for over a decade. In 2014 he resigned as Chief of Staff and moved to Mitchell, SD to work for Vantage Point Solutions. At a time as crucial as this for South Dakota, it is very important to elect the most qualified candidates for each position whether it's at a state or local level. Each election counts, and so does each vote. Get out and vote, South Dakota!

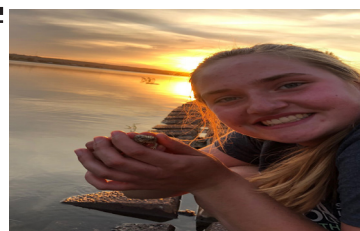
Bailey Wagner: Co-editor-in-chief

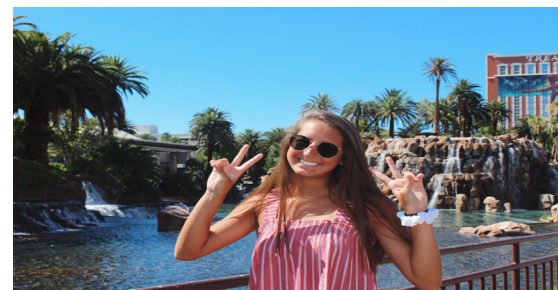
Natalie Mohr: Co-sports editor

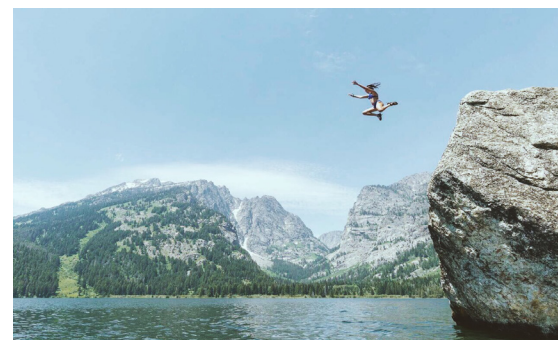

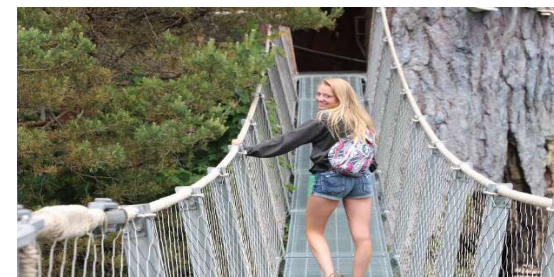
