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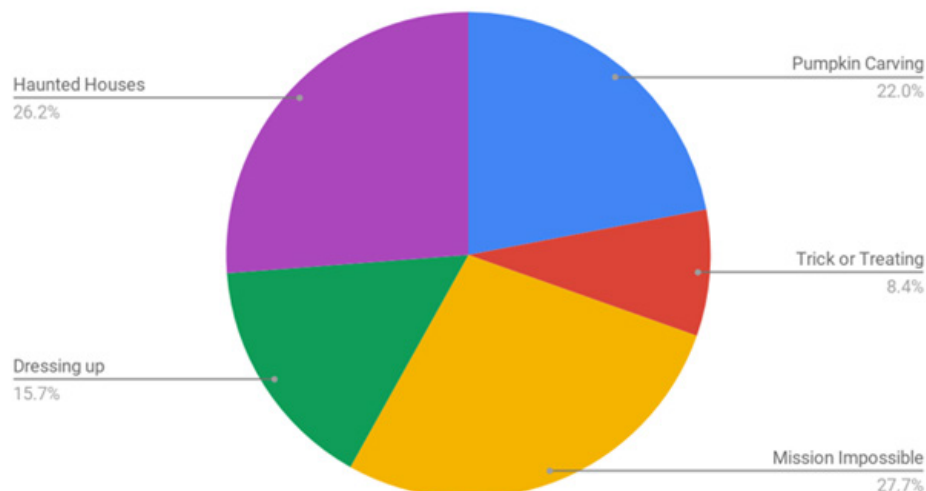

History of Halloween

Halloween, as we all know, is known for its scarier connection towards “scarier” themes. Examples of these are witches, bats, ghouls, and zombies. The history of Halloween, however, isn’t as scary as you’d think! Albeit, there are scarier things connected to it. Back in the eighth century, Halloween was connected to more religious values. In the eighth century, they called it “All Hallows Eve” as a day to prepare for the following holiday that took place on November 1st, All Saints Day. All Hallows Eve was a Celtic festival, and Pope Gregory III named these two holidays to represent and honor all saints. All Saints Day also marked the beginning of the new year, as well as the end of summer. People feared this time of year because they believe between the mark of October 31st and November 1st the realm between dead and alive was blurred, meaning more demonic and paranormal occurrences. After the celebration ceased, they re-lit their hearths in hopes that their celebration of the dead would protect them from all other ghouls that may harm them throughout the year. These holidays were mainly practiced in European countries, but as immigration occurred the holidays transferred to America, as well. Time went on, and the importance became more casual. However, that didn’t dismiss the superstitions. People knew the true connections towards All Hallows Eve and they still took precautions. Such precautions are using jack-o-lanterns to ward off evil spirits, wearing costumes to blend in with ghouls, and the controversy of witchcraft. There were other small things people looked out for, such as bats because it was believed they carried spirits, black cats which were often associated with witches, and supernatural energies which were connected with fortune tellers, who were believed to be witches. Halloween has grown into a more fun and happy-go-lucky tradition, but that doesn’t mean we should forget the roots of the holiday.

The runners ran all summer to build base mileage, so they could come into the season in shape. The boys competed first. Pierre's first runner over the finish line was senior, Tucker Berens. He placed 30th and ran the 5k in 17:14. Alejandro Ramirez, also a senior, was the next runner. He placed 52th with a time of 17:54, which is a new personal record. Pierre's 3rd runner to complete the 5k was Trevin Black Bear. He finished 63rd with a time of 18:08. Right on his heels was Hayden Shaffer. Shaffer placed 64th with a

new personal record of 18:12. Close behind Shaffer was Tyler Gere. Gere placed 68th with a new personal record of 18:16. The Governor's final two runners, Isaac Polak, and Ethan Gilk got 96th and 99th, respectively.

The Governors took a 10th place finish overall in the team standings. After the boy's concluded the girls' race began. The first Lady Governor to cross the line was Jessica Lutmer. She finished in 39th with a time of 20:10. Hunter Martell ran the 5k in 20:52 which earned her a 67th place finish. Right behind Martell was Autumn Iverson. She placed 72th with a 20:57. Kyla Keyes crossed the line in 21:11, earning herself an 82nd place finish. Halli Drewes placed 85th with a time of 21:16,

which is a new personal record. Rachel Nemec and Morgan Oedekoven placed 107th and 110th, respectively. The Lady Governors earned a 12th place overall in the Girls Class AA team standings. Congrats to all runners on the great season!
