The Marshal is resplendent in a leather scout suit, an heirloom in the Paddy Holm family. The three other Marshal candidates wear leather jackets, tan pants, and moccasins. The Marshal also wears a feather headdress.

The Master of Ceremonies for the Minneshosho Day activities will be the school mayor, John Finke. He will introduce the Queen and Marshall to the students and adults and present gifts to the royal-The Queen will also receive a beautiful bouquet.




#### Parlet Rides at Fair
