

Each year the National Merit Scholarship Corporation administers to high school juniors throughout the nation a qualitying test, the scores of which are used to determine the top students in the country. The students are not notified of their status in the program until their senior year, and this year some 15,000 students have been rated as semifinalists. All semifinalists who are endorsed by who fulfill their schools, all requirements, and whose scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) confirm their high standing on the NMSQT, will automatically become

Three Riggs Seniors have been finalists. Each finalist will receive a Certificate of Merit and will be considered for the approximately 1000 one-time National Merit \$1000 holarships and the 2000 sponsored Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1969. (Sponsored by scholarships are backed corporations other than the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and are renewable annually.) Winners of Merit Scholarships will be announced by May 1, 1969.

Riggs has had from 1 to 5 semifinalists every year that it has had students participating in the program. Only four finalists have been awarded scholarships. Riggs High Governor Arrow Edge Riggs The Pierre Governors dropped the

first ESD game of the season to the arrows. The Arrows. Watertown dominated the game from the start and came up with some impressive rushing statistics. The 13 - 6 score seems misleading compared to the statistics which show Pierre far behind the Watertown team. The Arrows had the ball 53 plays while the Governors had it for only 27 plays.

Pierre jumped off to an early lead when Woody Bunch blocked a punt, with the Watertown kicker standing inside his own ten yard strip. The touchdown came on a one yard run by Al Slaathaug. The extra point kick was good, also by Slaathaug. Watertown tied the score in the second period when Rick Jarboe scored from three yards out. The point kick was good. extra Watertown's Pat Murphy scored the winning touchdown on a one yard drive. The third quarter touchdown capped a 54-yard drive. Mark Larschied blocked the extra point attempt.

Watertown had 14 first downs compared to 3 for the Governors. The big edge came in the offensive rushing department. The Arrows gained 261 yards on the ground compared to 19 yards for the Pierre crew. Pierre did, however, lead in the passing phase of the game. They completed 3 of 6 passes for 31 yards. Watertown was 3 for 13 for 12 yards.

The Governor defense played most of the contest and did a very fine job under the conditions. Coach

Clanzer cited Dave Jensen, Woody Bunch, and Kim Krull for their defensive work. Jensen led the team in tackles with 13 and was followed by Wade Dowling and Kim Krull with 10 tackles apiece. Woody Bunch and Mark Larschied had 7 tackles.

The offensive was led by Al Slaathaug who rushed for 27 yards in

11 carries. Dryan ice rushed for 7 yards in as many carries. Mike Ridgway had four yards and Dennis Groff had two yards.

The Pierre Governor cross country team opened the 1968 season with two fine showings. They placed third at Redfield behind Huron and Faulkton on a 1.7 mile course. Leading the Governors were Bruce Neuharth with 4th and Kim Kurvink with a 6th. Dale Obenhauer and Rhys Schmidt were not far behind as they came in 10th and 13th. Bob Miller (15th), Jeff Fladeboe (22nd) and Daryl Williams (25th) completed the Pierre running threat.

A 7th place by Monty Granados led the Governors to a fine second place finish in the Mitchell Invitational. The Saturday meet was run over a 1.9 mile course and was won by a Sioux Falls cross country crew. Other Pierre runners playing were: Jim Ackerman (10th), Bruce Newharth (14th), Kim Kurvink (17th), Kurt Hoagland (18th), Dale Govenauer (20th), Bob Miller(23rd), Rhys Schmidt (29th), Tim Thayer (32nd), Terry Burge (34th) and Jeff Fladeboe (37th). There were 46 runners in the meet from surrounding towns.

Riggs Hi Enrollment Increased to 702

Enrollment in Riggs High School has reached a new peak with a record 702 students reporting for classes as of September 13. This figure is forty more than last year with the biggest increase in the sophomore class.

The Senior class has a total of 227, while last year there were 202 eniors. The Junior class has 219, fifteen less than last year's junior class. The sophomores have a total of 256 or thirty more than the sophomores in '68.

The class of '69 has seven less students than they had as juniors. The class of '70 had an enrollment of 226 last year as compared to 219 this fall

Junior High has total of 718, fourteen more than last year; elementary schools have an enrollment in of 1538, ninety five more than last year. The total enrollment in the Pierre schools on September 13 was 2958, compared to 2809 the previous year.
